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THE MYTHOLOGY OF HIGHLANDER

The mythology of Highlander is a succinct one. A secret race of Immortals who have existed throughout time battle each other to experience the Quickening, a surge of power from a defeated Immortal, and eventually come together in the Gathering, where the last two Immortals will battle for the last time and obtain the power of the Prize. Immortals are incapable of having children and they may not, under any circumstances, battle on holy ground. The Prize grants not only mortality and the ability to conceive, but also a god-like omniscience where the winner can sense and feel every thought across the world.

The concept of the Quickening shares a great similarity with the archaic usage of the word 'quick', meaning 'alive'. The Quickening, in this sense, finds much in common with the 18th century Gothic Romantic concept of 'sublimity', an experience - artistic, aesthetic, spiritual or intellectual - of beauty, awe and terror beyond all possible of calculation. This is experienced, for instance, by Connor as he ran with the stag, proclaiming he could feel its heartbeat, or Connor's training across breathtaking vistas with Ramirez. It is the feeling of a surge of life or oneness with nature, an echo of the power of the Prize. Curiously, however, the quickening is also the first signs of movement from a fetus in the womb, historically argued to be the first true signs of life. This is reflected in the 'birth' of an Immortal, who often suffers a grave injury, but recovers and enters into the life of an Immortal.

A KIND OF MAGIC QUEEN AND MICHAEL KAMEN By Lorraine Walsh

Highlander's cult status is due in part to Queen who wrote and performed almost half of the soundtrack that accompanies the film. Less infamous but significant nonetheless, is Michael Kamen's original score performed by the National Philharmonic Orchestra. There is a certain poignancy in listening to the soundtrack now, given that both Kamen and Mercury are no longer with us. Kamen died, aged 55, in 2003 and Freddie Mercury, died of Aids in 1991, just five years after the release of the Highlander film.

The script and a twenty minute montage of already filmed scenes provided enough inspiration for the four band members of Queen to write five original songs for Highlander, with only A Hammer to Fall originating from a previous album. Speaking about the process of writing for Highlander drummer Roger Taylor said they found "plenty of things in the plot to jump off". Typical of Queen each member wrote a completely different style of track for the film. Brian May, lead guitarist, inspired by the love story between the immortal Connor and his first love, the sadly mortal Heather, wrote the now classic Who Wants to Live Forever. In 1986, on the release of their A Kind of Magic album, May explains his take on the love story, "it was a strange kind of tragedy", that he could relate to his own life in that "love always comes to an end". Similarly, Brian Deacon, bass guitarist, was more inspired by the New York love scenes than the action in his wonderful, bluesy "slow ballad in a 6/8" rhythm, Just One Year of Love. Action inspired tracks include the guitar heavy, Gimme the Prize, the theme song for the villain of the film, The Kurgan and the heavy rock, opening track, Princes of the Universe. Although a planned release of a Highlander soundtrack album was canceled, probably due to the poor reception of the film, the Highlander inspired songs were developed and rearranged to become the fully fledged songs on the Queen nine track album A Kind of Magic, the title of the song and the album originating from a line in the film.

Michael Kamen, a young composer at the time of writing the score for Highlander went on to become a well respected conductor and composer with an eclectic style and work history. Included among his best known work are soundtracks for Robin Hood: Prince of Thieves (1991), X-men (2000) and Band of Brothers (2001). He also conducted Pink Floyd's, The Wall, performance in Berlin (1990), and worked with Metallica, David Bowie and Bob Dylan. His style varies on the Highlander tracks, the theme song is sci-fi inspired, in the vein of Star Wars, with electronic sections along with strings, brasses and the Scottish mandolin. Hauntingly beautiful is the instrumental accompaniment to the Connor/Heather love scenes on which Kamen collaborated with Brian May. Writing in 2016, Jonathan Broxton, Editor of Movie Music UK, said, "Highlander is the genesis of the action style Kamen perfected later" and "the intelligent thematic writing and the florid orchestral arrangements illustrate perfectly why so many hold him in such high regard".

Revisiting the Highlander soundtrack, it is notable that each of it's five contributors saw something different to inspire them, in an at the time unfinished film, but that is the nature of creativity. In the final editing of Highlander the potential of much of the soundtrack and score, perhaps was lost, in the rush to make an commercially, viable blockbuster. The music that Queen and to a certain extent Michael Kamen wrote, belong to another Highlander one that was more spectacular, more emotional, less sword-wielding action. Apologies in advance to die-hard fans, but imagine a version of Highlander, storyboarded solely on the music and lyrics that the four members of Queen wrote and Freddie Mercury sang. That surely, could be the one that lives forever.




great opportunity for us to bond over a common interest in swashbuckling and kilts. But all joking aside I'm very proud of all the student contributions and work.
